Details of the Maple Leaf Foods proposal, including:

- Up to 8 million litres of fresh water (& sewage) per day – processed by the City
- Implications & unaccounted for costs on City infrastructure (water, sewage, roads)
- 21,000 litres of toxic chemicals per week
- Two major exhaust stacks (chimneys) at the facility (wastewater & kill exhaust)
- No description of how offal & blood will be dealt with other than “offsite”
- Venting of chicken gas chamber CO₂ into the atmosphere
- Over 80% of maximum allowable nitrogen emissions will be produced
- No consideration of increased volumes of farms in surrounding area (up to 480,000 birds per day)
- Indigenous artefacts & “at risk” species onsite



What We Do
Water and Wastewater provides services to the people of London through 6 divisions:

Stormwater Management Engineering is responsible for stormwater treatment and flood control infrastructure planning, engineering and design. This group also comments on development applications and provides corporate-wide low impact development and hydrogeological services.

Wastewater and Drainage Engineering is responsible for wastewater and stormwater collection infrastructure planning, engineering and design. This includes lifecycle and growth works as well as the review of development applications.

Wastewater Treatment Operations is responsible for the operation and improvements of the City's five wastewater treatment plants and 36 wastewater pumping stations.

Sewer Operations is responsible for the operation and maintenance of the City's stormwater and sanitary sewer collection networks, stormwater treatment facilities. This group also provides emergency spills response and flood coordination services.

Water Engineering is responsible for water infrastructure planning, engineering and design. This includes lifecycle and growth works as well as the review of development applications. Water Engineering also manages the billing system and promotes water conservation and education.

Water Operations operates and maintains the drinking water distribution system. These professionals ensure compliance with all regulatory requirements in the spirit of continuous improvement and deliver high quality, reliable water to the residents and businesses of London.

Requested Zoning By-law Amendment

To change the zoning from an Open Space (OS4) Zone to an Open Space Special Provision (OS4(__)) Zone. Changes to the currently permitted land uses and development regulations are summarized below. The complete Zoning By-law is available at london.ca/planapps.

Current Zoning

Zone: Open Space (OS4) Zone

Permitted Uses: Conservation lands, conservation works, golf courses without structures, private parks without structures, public parks without structures, recreational golf courses without structures, cultivation or use of land for agricultural/horticultural purposes, sports fields without structures.

Special Provisions: None

Requested Zoning

Zone: Open Space Special Provision (OS4(__)) Zone

Permitted Uses: Conservation lands, conservation works, golf courses without structures, private parks without structures, public parks without structures, recreational golf courses without structures, cultivation or use of land for agricultural/horticultural purposes, sports fields without structures.

Special Provisions: To permit: office, studio, office (professional), business service establishment, convenience store, financial institution, personal service establishment, restaurant, medical/dental office, and commercial retail store uses; a reduced minimum front yard depth from a primary collector road of 0.5 metres; an interior side yard depth of 2.6 metres; a maximum lot coverage of 20%; a maximum building height of 17 metres; and a parking supply of 69 spaces for all permitted uses.

An Environmental Impact Study has been prepared to assist in the evaluation of this application.

Planning Policies

Any change to the Zoning By-law must conform to the policies of the Official Plan, London's long-range planning document. These lands are currently designated as Open Space in the Official Plan, which permits a range of open space uses as the main uses.



1. Policy Statement

- 1.1 This policy establishes the Mayor's New Year's Honour List for the recognition of persons who have contributed in an outstanding manner to the community of London in one of the categories of Accessibility, Age Friendly, Arts, Diversity and Race Relations, Environment, Heritage, Housing, Humanitarianism, Safety & Crime Prevention and Sports.

2. Definitions

- 2.1 Not applicable.

3. Applicability

- 3.1 This Council policy applies to all persons who have contributed in an outstanding manner to the community of London in prescribed categories.

4. The Policy

4.1 Categories

Persons may be recognized in any of the following categories:

- a) Accessibility (i.e. contributions to foster an environment of inclusion that embraces citizens of all abilities);
- b) Age Friendly (i.e. contributions to empowering older adults and advancing an age friendly community);
- c) Arts (i.e. contributions to fostering and/or the production of human creativity);
- d) Diversity and Race Relations (i.e. contributions to the elimination of hate and discrimination).
- e) Environment (i.e. contributions to the awareness, preservation and protection of the environment);
- f) Heritage (i.e. contributions to the awareness, preservation and protection of heritage resources);
- g) Housing (i.e. contributions to the provision of safe and accessible housing for all members of the community);
- h) Humanitarianism (i.e. contributions to human welfare through philanthropic and other efforts);
- i) Safety & Crime Prevention (i.e. contributions to a safe and secure community); or

- j) Sports (i.e. contributions to the awareness of and participation in sports activity and/or demonstrated excellence within a particular sports activity).

4.2 Nominating Committees/Organizations

The following Committees/Organizations shall nominate individuals in the respective categories:

- a) Accessibility – Accessibility Advisory Committee
- b) Age Friendly – Age Friendly London Network
- c) Arts – London Arts Council
- d) Diversity and Race Relations – Diversity, Inclusion and Anti-Oppression Advisory Committee
- e) Environment – Advisory Committee on the Environment
- f) Heritage – London Advisory Committee on Heritage
- g) Housing – London Housing Advisory Committee
- h) Humanitarianism – Diversity, Inclusion and Anti-Oppression Advisory Committee
- i) Safety & Crime Prevention – Community Safety and Crime Prevention Advisory Committee
- j) Sports – London Sports Council

4.3 Conditions

The following conditions shall apply to the nomination of individuals:

- a) a maximum of ten persons shall be named in any one year, with no more than one being from each of the ten categories referred to above subject to:
 - i) a person may not necessarily be named in each category each year;
 - ii) City Council may, at its sole discretion and on an exception basis, choose to recognize two individuals in any one category in a given year should the City Council determine that two individuals have inseparably partnered in contributing to their respective category, thereby increasing the aggregate amount of nominees beyond the usual maximum of ten persons to be named in any one year;
- b) the recipients shall be chosen for long standing contributions in their respective categories;
- c) the name of any one individual shall be included on the Honour List only once in their lifetime;
- d) any person currently serving as a member of any one of the Advisory Committees or organizations referred to in 4.2 shall not be eligible for naming to the list during their term of appointment;
- e) nominees being recommended by the Advisory Committees or organizations referred to in 4.2 shall have at least seventy-five percent of the total eligible votes on the respective Advisory Committee or organization.

4.4 Form of Recognition

- a) The recipients shall be honoured at the first meeting of City Council in January, with a reception for themselves and one guest, and presentation of an appropriately-worded certificate.
- b) A plaque shall be displayed in a prominent public area of City Hall honouring those persons named each year to the Mayor's New Year's Honour List and shall be updated annually by the City Clerk.
