Building a Sustainable City Sub Committee Report to the Advisory Committee on the Environment

Committee Objective:

To present and provide comment on objectives related to "Building a Sustainable City", as identified as an area of focus in the London Strategic Plan.

Minutes:

- Committee agreed to meet once a month.
- Meetings will involve discussions on current events, with updates and action items for long term projects.
- With membership currently low, the committee will focus on one or two larger projects.

Mass Timber

We have decided to investigate the potential applications of Cross Laminated Timber (CLT) and other mass timber products within London.

Mass timber construction is built using engineered wood products typically made of large, solid wood panels, columns, or beams often manufactured off-site for load-bearing wall, floor, and roof construction.

This technology is carbon negative, both sequestering carbon and reducing high emission materials like steel and concrete. Paired with its utilization of sustainable timber harvesting, it is an innovative solution for any city that is being pushed by the pressures of a housing explosion and a climate emergency.

In addition to the benefits to the environment, mass timber has local manufacturing and design partners looking for a friendly city to implement these ideas and fits into the Ontario government's forest sector strategy. Combined with the most recent National Building Code of Canada changes allowing 6-story wood structures, the forest city could live up to its name while showing the rest of Ontario that greening city projects can help be a driving force behind economic recovery and innovation.

Action items:

- Request from staff, an update on cities position on Mass Timber, along with any current/future projects involving renewable building materials.

- Reach out to industry experts and determine ROI and environmental impact of Mass Timber.

Encouraging the Growing of Food in Urban Areas – City-wide

File: OZ-9332/City of London What is Proposed?

Amendments to the London Plan and Zoning By-law to make it easier to grow food in the urban area in accordance with the Urban Agriculture Strategy, which was adopted by Council in November 2017. This project focuses on the "Growing" component of the Strategy and is being considered under the Strategy's guiding principle to develop supportive municipal policies, regulations, and bylaws, and remove policy barriers to urban agriculture. The intent of the changes is to expand the permissions for urban greenhouses, consider policies and regulations to permit growing of food in most place types and zones, and review application process requirements for urban agriculture. Other City Departments, interested agencies, urban agriculture interest groups and the general public will be consulted before changes are made.

Any change to the Zoning By-law must conform to the policies of the London Plan and the 1989 Official Plan, London's long-range planning documents. There are a number of policies in the London Plan which support urban agriculture, particularly the Food System policies (Policy 648-686). The 1989 Official Plan contains general references to agriculture and horticulture which support those uses in specific designations and zones.

Attend a Future Public Participation Meeting

The Planning and Environment Committee will consider the requested Official Plan and zoning changes on a date that has not yet been scheduled. The City will send you another notice inviting you to attend this meeting, which is required by the Planning Act. You will also be invited to provide your comments at this public participation meeting. A neighbourhood or community association may exist in your area. If it reflects your views on this application, you may wish to select a representative of the associations are listed on the <u>Neighbourgood</u> website. The Planning and Environment Committee will make a recommendation to Council, which will make its decision at a future Council meeting.

What Are Your Legal Rights?

Notification of Council Decision

If you wish to be notified of the decision of the City of London on the proposed official plan amendment and zoning by-law amendment, you must make a written request to the City Clerk, 300 Dufferin Ave., P.O. Box 5035, London, ON, N6A 4L9, or at <u>docservices@london.ca</u>. You will also be notified if you speak to the Planning and Environment Committee at the public meeting about this application and leave your name and address with the Secretary of the Committee.

Right to Appeal to the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal

If a person or public body would otherwise have an ability to appeal the decision of the Council of the Corporation of the City of London to the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal but the person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the City of London before the proposed official plan amendment is adopted, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision.

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the City of London before the proposed official plan amendment is adopted, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal unless, in the opinion of the Tribunal, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party. If a person or public body would otherwise have an ability to appeal the decision of the Council of the Corporation of the City of London to the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal but the person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the City of London before the by-law is passed, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision.

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the City of London before the by-law is passed, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal unless, in the opinion of the Tribunal, there are reasonable grounds to do so.
