RECOMMENDATION	

That, on the recommendation of the Director of Land Use Planning and City Planner, the following candidates **BE APPROVED** for the positions listed below on the Urban Design Peer Review Panel:

- a. David Yuhasz Position of Architect
- b. Blair Scorgie Position of Design Professional (Urban Designer)
- c. Julie Bogdanowicz Position of Design Professional (Urban Designer)

BACKGROUND

On November 26, 2012, Planning and Environment Committee approved a revised Terms of Reference for the Urban Design Peer Review Panel. The revised Terms of Reference outlined the makeup of the Panel with the following positions: three (3) Architects and three (3) other professionals that influence the design of the built environment and are registered in their field; these fields include, in order of preference, Landscape Architecture, Urban Design, Planning or other professional fields that influence the design of the built environment. The terms of reference also staggered the terms of Panel appointees to balance the Panel's representation between a desire for consistency of operation while allowing for fresh perspectives. The Terms of Reference indicates Panel members are to be approved by Council upon the recommendation of administration.

Panel members serve a two (2) year term from the date of their appointment and shall not sit for two consecutive terms. On January 1, 2015 the expiry of these term limits applied to three (3) panellists. At this application cycle, the positions required to be filled are for one (1) architect and two (2) professionals that influence the design of the built environment.

Overall, the candidates noted in this report provide a full complement of expertise in the various disciplines. The overall collective experience of the candidates will assist the City as we move forward and continue to elevate the presence of the Panel within the development approvals process.

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



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Work experience: I have managed projects across a variety of scales including public realm and streetscape design guidelines; private realm and architectural control guidelines; waterfront, campus, downtown, and urban corridor master plans; regeneration and revitalization strategies; intensification strategies; policy reviews and amendments; Ontario Municipal Board case files; development approvals; and architectural peer reviews. Recent projects include the Memorial University of Newfoundland Fisheries and Marine Institute Master Plan; the Downsview Park Stanley Greene Neighbourhood Architectural Control Guidelines; the Guelph Downtown Built Form Standards and Streetscape Manual; the Barrie Hewitt / Salem Secondary Plans; the Caledon Intensification Strategy; the Saskatoon Neighbourhood Level Infill Development Strategy; the Kingston Williamsville Main Street Study and associated Cycling Strategy; the Whitby Waterfront Parks and Open Spaces Master Plan; the University of Saskatchewan College Quarter Master Plan and associated Recreation Plan; the Toronto Avenues and Mid Rise Buildings Study; and various other endeavours with private land developers.

Education: I am a Registered Professional Planner, Urban Designer, and Project Manager with Brook McIlroy Inc. Skills: As my summary of experience demonstrates, I have a breadth of experience working with Public Sector, Private Sector, and Not-for-Profit agencies on a wide range of projects. Unique expertise includes best practices in mainstreet and neighbourhood oriented mid-rise building design; neighbourhood-oriented secondary suite and laneway housing design; waterfront park and open space design; transit-oriented development planning; and downtown revitalization and regeneration work.

Work experience: I have been working professionally as an architect for about a decade. I have worked in Vancouver (Hotson Bakker Boniface Haden), Toronto (CS&P, KPMB and Workshop Architecture) and New York (KOKO, Asymptote) with a stint in Abu Dhabi. I have worked across all scales and across a variety of building types. I have also worked on master plans and landscape plans. I am currently working for the City of Toronto in Urban Design. My work primarily includes development application review which involves taking project to the Design Review Panel once we determine that the project is "ready" and has met our urban design objectives. Also, for the last five years, I have been a sessional Lecturer at the University of Toronto's architecture school where I teach a lecture class on urban landscape and design studios. I am also frequently asked to attend reviews at the University of Waterloo.

Education: I have a diverse background: Bachelor of Art in Geography and Environmental Studies and a Master of Architecture degree from UBC. I am a registered architect with the OAA.

Skills: As a practicing architect, I have the ability to quickly interpret architectural drawings and determine how a project can be improved.
