What is Mid-Century Modern?

- New term used to identify mid-20th century design
- Circa 1940s 1970s
- Reaction to Beaux Arts of the Pre-War Period
- Grew out of Chicago School (Louis Sullivan), Prairie Style (Frank Lloyd Wright), Bauhaus (Walter Gropius & Mies van der Rohe)
 - Modernist architects and designers collaborated across all fields to create <u>complete environments</u> (buildings, furniture, ceramics, glass, textile, etc.)
- Cultural shift: housing demand (suburbs), car culture, modern convenience, optimism of Post-War Era, Atomic Age, magazines
- New/affordable materials: vitrolite, bakelite, glass block, reinforced concrete, plywood, aluminum, composites, steel
 - Large glass panes
 - Uninterrupted voids of space: open interiors, indoor/outdoor spaces
 - Beyond traditional hipped or gable roof low roofs, deep eaves
 - Authentic materials and structure expressed
 - Geometric forms




