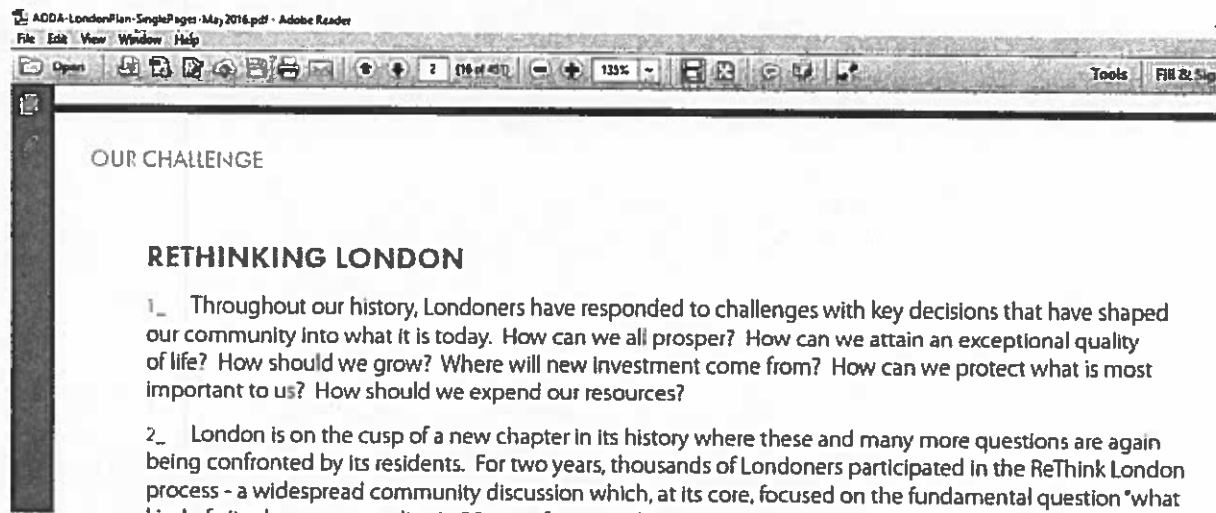


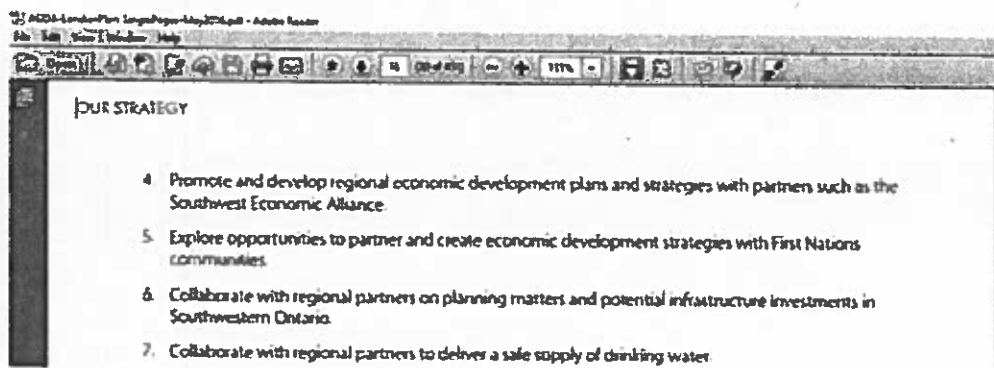
Comments – The London Plan

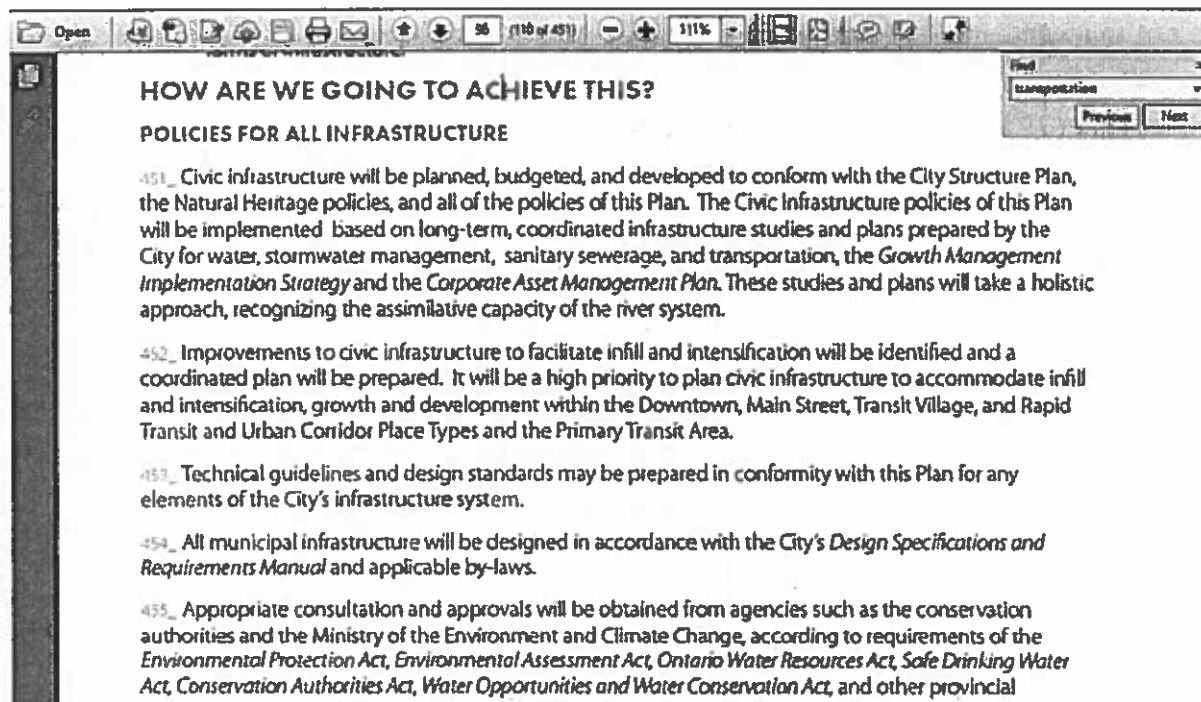
Insertion of paragraph outlining commitment to meaningfully work with First Nations neighbours under section entitled Planning for Rethinking London, page 3. In addition, descendants of the modern day communities Chippewas of the Thames (COTTFN), Aamjiwnaang First Nation, Chippewas of Kettle & Stoney Point and Bkejwanong First Nation signed the London Township Treaty, 1796. The signing of this treaty occurred at the forks of the Thames. COTTFN could provide further detail, as required.



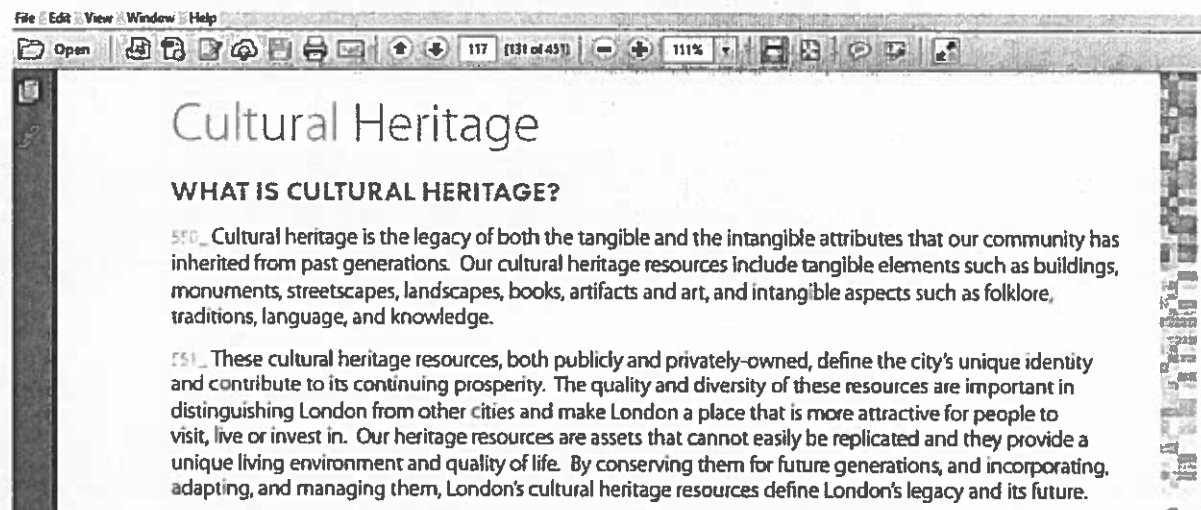
2. Use consistent language. There are references throughout the document (pg. 21, 22) to *indigenous, First Nations, and Aboriginal.*
3. Direction #2, item 5, page 21: broaden this paragraph to include words like *relationship building, collaboration, etc.* A working relationship includes more than creating economic development with First Nations communities.



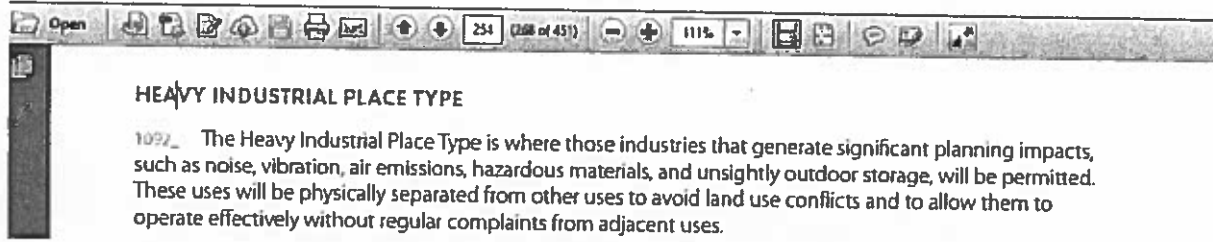
4. Indicate appropriate consultation with neighbouring First Nations communities under Policies for All Infrastructure, page 97:



5. Insertion of paragraph highlighting/listing all 3 communities neighbouring the City of London, under Cultural Heritage - What is Cultural Heritage (page 137); Chippewas of the Thames First Nation, Munsee-Delaware Nation, Oneida Nation of the Thames.



- 6. In Heavy Industrial Place Type, section 1092, page 286, significant planning impacts for heavy industrial should include storm water management and sanitary sewer discharge.



- 7. Insertion of a paragraph listing all items that trigger the City of London's engagement with neighbouring First Nations communities; Civic Infrastructure, Natural Heritage, Natural Resources, Environmental Review and any item pertaining the Healthy Watersheds. A recommendation is to separate Neighbouring Municipalities and First Nations Communities. (page 377). Indicate appropriate consultation and accommodation in each of these sections.
