




In addition, descendants of the modern day communities Chippewas of the Thames (COTTFN), Aamjiwnaang First Nation, Chippewas of Kettle & Stoney Point and Bkejwanong First Nation signed the London Township Treaty, 1796. The signing of this treaty occurred at the forks of the Thames. COTTFN could provide further detail, as required.




- 2. Use consistent language. There are references throughout the document (pg. 21, 22) to indigenous, First Nations, and Aboriginal.
- 3. Direction #2, item 5, page 21: broaden this paragraph to include words like *relationship building*, *collaboration*, etc. A working relationship includes more than creating economic development with First Nations communities.



4. Indicate appropriate consultation with neighbouring First Nations communities under Policies for All Infrastructure, page 97:

NEIGHBOURING MUNICIPALITIES AND PROTINGTIONS COMMUNITIES

City Council will engage and consult with Middlesex County, neighbouring municipalities and First Nations on matters of mutual interest and concern, and specifically liaise with neighbouring municipalities and/or First Nations on development proposals or matters which could affect the City and neighbouring municipalities and/or First Nations.

The appropriate First Nations shall be provided notification in regard to the Identification of burial sites and significant archaeological resources relating to the activities of their ancestors. If the City of London initiates the preparation of an Archaeological Management Plan, the appropriate First Nations shall be notified and invited to participate in the process.
