RECOMMENDATION

That, on the recommendation of the Director of Social and Community Support Services with the concurrence of the Executive Director of Community Services, the following report **BE RECEIVED** for information purposes.

PREVIOUS REPORTS PERTINENT TO THIS MATTER

Profile of Ontario Works Participants (March 2004; September 2007; September 2008; September 2009; September 2010)

BACKGROUND

Annually, the Community Services Department provides the Community and Neighbourhoods Committee (CNC), formerly the Community and Protective Services Committee (CPSC) with a profile report of the Ontario Works caseload (Appendix A). This profile provides the City of London, Municipal Council, and the broader community with Ontario Works caseload information needed to allow for good planning and trend analysis.

The data for this profile report is provided by Ministry Reports as well as by a local extract of information captured in Ontario Works Service Delivery Model Technology (SDMT). Local extract data for this report is consistently pulled on the third Monday in July.



PARTICIPANT PROFILE REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

General Caseload Description

The following summary profile provides a general picture of the 2011 caseload:

- In the first half of 2011:
 - Almost 11,000 households, representing approximately 24,000 people received Ontario Works assistance each month. This represents 6.6 per cent of London's population; and
 - o 47 per cent of these households were single individuals.




In July:

- The majority of households participating in Ontario Works lived in the N5V, N5W, N5Y, and N5Z postal code areas which correspond to the Carling, Argyle, Glen Cairn and Huron Heights planning districts. Almost nine out of ten rent from the private market;
- The age profile of female applicants on the caseload was younger than the age profile of male applicants;
- About two thirds of all people receiving benefits were adults and one third were children under the age of 18 years;
- Thirty-five per cent of households were families with children. Most families with children were single parent families;
- Almost half of the approximately 7,000 children living in households that participated in Ontario Works were under the age of 7 years;
- o Over half of the applicants report achieving high school education or higher; and
- Fifty five per cent of the households had been receiving assistance for over one year.
 Of these, 63 per cent had been receiving assistance for a period of 2 years or longer.

Breakdown of Caseload by Selected Populations

While a general description of London's Ontario Works caseload is provided, in reality the caseload is heterogeneous in a number of ways. The chart below provides an overview of some of the populations that may have distinct and unique characteristics and needs.




Trends

Since 2006, the year that caseload was at its lowest size since the late 1980's, the caseload has increased by 46 per cent. Most of this growth is due to growth in the number of single individuals receiving Ontario Works. Growth was driven more by the increase in the number of people entering the caseload than by a change in the number of people exiting the caseload.

Highlights of data available since 2007, the first year that much of the local profile data could be extracted and the first year of caseload growth include:

- For the last two years, households on the caseload have been receiving assistance longer than in previous years;
- The number of 18 to 21 year olds and the number of 46 to 65 year olds has increased more than other age groups on the caseload;
- The number of children living in families receiving assistance increased by 19 per cent, with the number of 0 to 6 year olds growing more than other age groups; and
- Landed immigrants and refugee claimants have comprised between 14 per cent and 16 per cent of the caseload over the past five years.



Data on employment outcomes have been available since 2005. Since 2009, employment outcomes have improved. For example, the number of people gaining employment and the number of cases leaving Ontario Works with employment since have increased.




SECTION 1: INFORMATION ON THE TOTAL CASELOAD

Data for this section of the report is from a variety of Service Delivery Management Technology reports and a local data extract. In some cases, data represents average monthly figures, in others, the data is a snapshot of July 18, 2011.


Caseload Size: Number of Individuals and Number of Households

Almost 11,000 households totalling an average of about 24,000 people including all adults and children received Ontario Works income each month in the first half of 2011. This represents approximately 6.6% of London's household and total population.

The majority of households participating in Ontario Works lived in the N5V, N5W, N5Y and N5Z postal code areas which correspond to the Carling, Argyle, Glen Cairn and Huron Heights Planning Districts. Central London had the highest number of households that received assistance.



Housing Tenure


Almost nine out of 10 households that received assistance rented from the private market. Note that "other" housing tenure types include home ownership, boarding, homeless, addiction program, nursing home, addiction treatment.




Age and Gender

Just over half of the households receiving Ontario Works in July were headed by women (51.5%) and 48.5% were headed by men. Overall, the women on the caseload were younger than the men:


- Women accounted for 57 per cent of the Ontario Works population age 35 years and younger and men accounted for 43 per cent;
- Men accounted for 55 per cent of the Ontario Works population between the ages of 36 and 65 years, and women accounted for 45 per cent.


Of all the people who received benefits in July 2011, 64% were adults and 36% were children under the age of 18.




Family Type

On average each month from January to June, almost half of households were single individuals and just over one quarter were sole support parents. Of the couple households, almost 70 per cent were couples with children and 30 per cent were couples without children.

In July, just over one third of the caseload were families with children and 77 per cent of these families were sole support families. The average family had almost 2 children, for a total of almost 7,000 children. On average each month, half of all children were under the age of seven.






Education

In July, over half of households reported obtaining grade 12 education or higher.



Caseload Dynamics

In the first half of 2011, a total of 4,312 households entered London's Ontario Works program and a total of 3,085 left.


The main reasons for needing assistance are: inability to obtain employment (68%), separated with dependents (10%), ill health (9%), and Employment Insurance exhausted (3.5%).

In July, 46 per cent of households had received assistance for less than one year, and 55 per cent had been receiving benefits for one year or longer.



Employment Outcomes

In the first half of 2011, 10 per cent of households earned employment income and a total of 1,741 people gained employment. Almost one quarter of households that exited Ontario Works left with employment income.








The average figure is the total cumulative number of months that all households on the caseload have received assistance divided by the number of cases. The median is the middle value. The difference between the months on assistance average and median figures for most of the populations signifies that the median figure is more representative of the population's time on assistance than is the average figure.




SECTION 3: TRENDS

Caseload Size and Dynamics


Since 2007, the year that sustained caseload growth began, the caseload has increased by 46 per cent.




From 2007 to 2009, caseload growth was been driven by an increase in the cumulative number of households entering the Ontario Works program, coupled with a reduction in the cumulative number exiting the program. Caseload growth in 2011 has been driven by a decline in the number of households leaving Ontario Works.



The average and median number of months on assistance was at its lowest in 2009. This was due to the high number of entries to Ontario Works and the low number of exits from the program. Since then, time on assistance figures have increased.




Age


Compared to 2007, the 18 to 21 year old age group has grown the most, increasing by almost 75 per cent. The 46 to 65 year old age group has grown by 60 per cent.




Family Type

Since to 2007, the couples and singles caseloads have grown by more than 50 per cent. The singles caseload accounted for 58 per cent of total caseload growth while the couples caseload accounted for 29 per cent of total growth.








Children

The proportion of households with children has been decreasing. The increase in child benefits may contribute to this decline. From 2007 to 2010, the number of children living in families receiving assistance increased by 19 per cent. Most of this growth was due to an increase in the number of 0 to 6 year olds.






Interpreter Requests

Although the proportion of the caseload that are landed immigrants and refugee claimants has stayed between 14 per cent and 16 per cent since 2007, the top languages requested have changed. Spanish has consistently been the top requested language followed by Arabic. In 2011, Spanish accounted for 47 per cent of all interpreter requests while Arabic accounted for 19 per cent.

Immigrant Trends: Top Ten Interpreter Requests (January to June)








Employment Outcomes

Since 2009, the number of people gaining employment in the first half of the year has been increasing. The percent of the caseload with employment income has remained steady for the last three years, and remains lower than it was from 2005 to 2008. Exits due to employment have increased over the last three years, in both actual numbers and as a per cent of all cases leaving Ontario Works.
