| SUBJECT: | LONDON COMMUNITY GRANTS PROGRAM OUTCOMES AND SUSTAINABILITY PLANS FOR ALL FUNDED ORGANIZATIONS |

RECOMMENDATION

That, on the recommendation of the Managing Director of Neighbourhood, Children and Fire Services, the report providing an update on the London Community Grants Program **BE RECEIVED** for information.

BACKGROUND

At its meeting held on July 27, 2016, Municipal Council resolved that the following actions be taken with respect to the London Community Grants Program:

- a) the staff report dated July 25, 2016, providing an update on the London Community Grants Program, BE RECEIVED for information; and
- b) the Civic Administration BE REQUESTED report back annually with respect to outcomes and sustainability for grant recipients. (3/18/SPPC).

The purpose of this report is to provide Council with the projected outcomes and sustainability plans for the programs that were funded through both streams of the London Community Grants Program (Multi-Year for 2017-2019 and Innovation & Capital for 2017), and outline the approach to be undertaken to report back to Council on an annual basis, aligning outcomes to the Strategic Plan for the City of London strategic areas of focus (Strengthening our Community, Building a Sustainable City, and Growing our Economy).

London Community Grants Program

The London Community Grants Program is linked to the City's Strategic Plan in the strategic area of focus: *Leading in Public Service* (open, accountable and responsive government). The intent of this modernized granting process is to ensure:

- funding outcomes align with the Strategic Plan for the City of London. This means that grants are based on organizations' demonstrated outcomes which are directly linked to the Strategic Areas of Focus set out in the Plan;
- beyond operational funding, there is a funding stream that supports innovation and collaboration;
- there is strong fiscal responsibility and understanding of where funds are being allocated; and,
- there is a transparent model for funding that is fair to all applicants.

London Community Grants Program Outcome Reporting and Sustainability Plans

1. Outcomes

Through the London Community Grants Program, organizations identified the outcomes that would be achieved through City of London funding contributions. Outcomes for funding through this program are aligned to the City of London's Strategic Plan and the strategic areas of focus. Organizations were granted funding that could demonstrate the following:

- the organization's ability to achieve outcomes that will support the Strategic Plan;
- credibility of organizations to provide London residents with services, activities, and opportunities at the neighbourhood and city-wide level;
- capacity of the organization requesting the funds; and,
- the ability of the organization to leverage additional investment in the community.

Once approved for funding, Civic Administration supported organizations to finalize their outcomes, which are included in the formal grant agreements. A complete list of the outcomes funded through the London Community Grants Program for 2017 can be found in Appendix 1.

2. Sustainability

In addition to outcomes, applications to the London Community Grants Program were assessed to determine the sustainability of the program and/or service that municipal funding would be used to support. In evaluating sustainability, the following was considered:

- the organization demonstrates that it has applied to a number of "relevant" funding sources (provincially, federally, locally) showing that the City of London is not to be the sole funder of the service/project;
- the applicant identifies partnerships that may cost share in service/project delivery;
- the organization has adequate operational reserves and a plan to deal with reserves/surpluses;
- the organization has a sustainability plan to move towards self-sufficiency;
- the organization can demonstrate feasibility of long-term sustainability, leadership and institutional support; and,
- the organization can demonstrate anchor institutions as partners in the community.

The sustainability plans for each program/service funded through the London Community Grants Program can be seen in Appendix 1. Generally, organizations identified the following as strategies to sustain their municipally funded programs once that funding has ended:

- diversify funding sources by seeking and leveraging funding from funders, foundations, other levels
 of government, donations, sponsorship, and planned giving gifts;
- develop and/or increase fees for service/membership fees/vendor fees;
- revenue generation opportunities;
- find cost and program efficiencies;
- explore a social enterprise model/shared space model/ merger with other organization; and,
- identify additional community partners and share resources.

Next Steps

Civic Administration will continue to work with all funded organizations to monitor ongoing financial and outcome reporting as outlined in the formal grant agreements.

In addition, Civic Administration will create an annual report which will include a roll up of outcomes achieved and stories of impact, aligned with the strategic areas of focus in the Strategic Plan. Civic Administration will share this annual report to Council by the end of the first quarter of each year beginning in 2018.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

Annual funding to support the London Community Grants Program exists in the Neighbourhood, Children and Fire Services base budget, which was approved through the 2016-19 Multi-Year Budget process. \$2.3 million of funding has been allocated through the Multi-Year stream annually from 2017 through 2019. In addition, \$174,000 has been allocated through the Innovation and Capital stream for 2017. The amount available through the Innovation and Capital stream is anticipated to be approximately \$312,000 in 2018 and approximately \$496,000 in 2019.

The amount of funding allocated to the municipal granting program will be confirmed each year as part of the annual budget update process. Should any adjustments be required to the funding allocated to the modernized program, a business case would be prepared which would require Council approval.

SUMMARY

As a City, we continue to focus on investments that enhance local capacity, support accessible, responsive programming, increase quality of life for all, and continue to make London a leader in commerce, culture and innovation – our region's connection to the World.
