#### Council resolution a)

· February 1, 2017 resolved:

That the following actions be taken in response to the President of the United States of America's executive order to ban individuals and families from Syria, Iran, Sudan, Iraq, Yemen, Libya and Somalia from entering the United States of America:

a) the Civic Administration BE DIRECTED to consult with the Diversity, Inclusion and Anti-Oppression Advisory Committee (DIAAC) and the community stakeholders who are working on the Diversity and Inclusion Strategy, and report back at a future meeting of the Strategic Priorities and Policy Committee with the appropriate arrangements for the City of London to become a Sanctuary City where residents can expect access to service without fear:



#### Council resolution b)

b) the Mayor BE REQUESTED and the Civic Administration BE DIRECTED to communicate to the Federal Government, including the Ministry of Immigration and Citizenship, that the City of London continues to be committed to receiving refugees from Syria, Iran, Sudan, Iraq, Yemen, Libya, and Somalia who have been banned from entry to the United States of America as per the President's recent Executive Order;



#### **Jurisdictional Context**

- Canada is a federal state, with the federal government possessing exclusive constitutional jurisdiction over immigration policies and regulations.
- Municipalities do not have the legal authority to grant permanent resident status nor offer "sanctuary"



### What is a "Sanctuary City"

#### Working definitions are:

Canadian Model	American Model
"City is where all residents have full rights to access all city services and city-administered services without fear, regardless of their documentation"	"City that does not allow municipal funds or resources to be used to enforce federal immigration laws"



## What is an "Undocumented Individual"



#### How many are there?

- "Undocumented Individuals" without status refers to a person who has not been granted permission to stay in the country, or who has overstayed their visa.
- The majority come into Canada through authorized programs but for various reasons, their status lapses.
- This includes refugee claimants awaiting a decision, failed refugee claimants still in the country or workers and students whose visas have expired.
- Although there are no official statistics, politicians and the media tend to claim there are between 200,000-500,000 nonstatus migrants in Canada (Toronto, Montreal, and Vancouver).
- In 2003, Ontario's Construction Secretariat estimated there were 76,000 non-status migrants in Ontario's construction industry alone.
- In a recent study on emergency room consultations suggests that there are at least 58,000 non-status migrants in Ontario.



#### Other Canadian city models

- Toronto: Toronto for All; United as a Sanctuary City, Jan 2017
  - Policies: improve access without fear for individuals requesting services at City and City-funded agencies;
  - > Training of front-line staff and managers
  - ➤ Complaints system
  - ➤ Discussions with police on *don't ask* policy.
- Hamilton: Access to services for undocumented individuals (2014)
  - ➤ Public Education
  - ➤ Training of front-line staff
  - > Federal and provincial advocacy



#### Other Canadian city models

- Vancouver: Access to City Services without Fear 2016
  - Policy applies to City-funded excluding police, parks and library services
  - > However City encourages City-funded services to adopt access policies which support the "spirit and objectives" of this policy
  - ➤ Guidelines for City staff, staff training
  - > Complaint mechanism
  - ➤ Public awareness
  - ➤ Advocacy



#### **Newest Addition: Montreal**

February 20<sup>th</sup> 2017; the City of Montreal declared itself a "Sanctuary City" for unauthorized immigrants

- Commitment to offer access to city programs and services, particularly municipal housing, without fear of being detained or deported
- A plan for undocumented people in "vulnerable situations" to receive assistance from Montreal police without being reported to immigration officials
- A call on the Quebec gov't, provincial immigration, to ensure access to health care, emergency services and lodging
- A call on the federal gov't to regularize the status of undocumented migrants



#### **Opportunities**

Individual Level	Municipal Level
<ul> <li>Individuals could access appropriate services without fear of being arrested or reported to the CBSA (Canadian Border Security Agency)</li> </ul>	Identify services available for all, regardless of immigration status
<ul> <li>Reduces isolation, promotes engagement in community</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Educate the importance of giving access to those in need, especially those who are vulnerable</li> </ul>
Improved mental health	Aligns with 2015-'19 City of London Strategic Plan



## What could the City of London do?



# How is this different from what already happens?

- · Offer full access to municipal services
- Encourage city-funded agencies to improve access without fear
- Staff training
- · Develop public education
- Advocate with provincial and federal governments to improve access to provincial and federal programs
- Numerous city services are already available to undocumented individuals and staff don't usually ask about immigration status unless mandated to do so
- e.g. recreation, Service London, emergency shelters, crash beds, outreach services, dropins, needle-exchange programs, 211
