#### Actions to focus on:

- Identify gender-responsive locally relevant and owned interventions.
   Develop and effectively implement comprehensive policies to prevent and respond to sexual violence in public spaces.
   Investments in the safety and economic viability of public
- spaces.
- Change attitudes and behaviors to promote women's and girls' rights to enjoy public spaces free from violence.



- ½ LGBTQ+, 82% of women with disabilities
- since 2004, the incidence rate has not changed- but for other violence crimes, dropped more than 35%
- 1000 calls to our sexual assault crisis line in 2016
- 750 individual sexual assault survivors in counselling
- and still, ANOVA has a counselling waitlist of over 50 sexual assault survivors

### Local context

- Informal City Bus Survey
  - 122 sexual harassment
    44 sexual assaults
    30 threats of sexual assaults
- Unfounded story and followup
   30% of cases in London, one of highest in country
   Training, possible Philadelphia Model
- Sex Ed Curriculum has been rolled out in local schools
- Sexual Violence Coordinators on each campus Centre for Research on Violence –sexual harassment in the workplace professional training & online certificate
- Salvation Army 'Support to Report' Case Manager- increase reports of sexual assaults amongst those in sex trade
