From representing international consumer brands as a public relations professional to working as a journalist, I have had the privilege of interacting with and learning from the best in the business. Past contributions: I have been an active member of the community since I moved to Canada in 2004. As a Londoner, I feel a strong sense of responsibility towards working together to make our community more accepting, more equitable and more welcoming for everyone. In the past, I have had the opportunity to try to make a difference in the lives of our neighbours and friends as a volunteer on several committees. In 2014, I volunteered on the London Sports Celebrity Dinner and Auction committee.
