Re: International Plowing Match

As you are aware, there is an opportunity for the City of London to host the International Plowing Match in 2020.

Municipal Council, at the meeting held on October 17, 2017, resolved:

- "a) the Ontario Plowmen's Association BE ADVISED that the City of London is interested in the potential for the City of London hosting an International Plowing Match in London, Ontario, subject to the City of London undertaking the necessary due diligence in order to determine whether or not it wishes to submit a formal bid to host the event;" and
- b) the City Manager, in liaison with the appropriate City staff and partners, BE REQUESTED to determine what financial or other resources would be required in connection with the event and where those resources would be sourced, and report back with the information so that the Municipal Council can make an informed decision with respect to whether or not the City Of London wishes to commit to hosting the event;"

At the December 12, 2017 meeting of Municipal Council, the staff report entitled "Financial and Other Resources Required to Host the International Plowing Match 2020" submitted in response to b) above, was received.

Dear Mayor Brown and Members of Council:

Re: Consideration for future bid to host the Ontario International Plowing Match and Rural Expo

The London Chamber of Commerce has long advocated for the economic contributions the agricultural sector brings to our local and regional economies. Through the Chamber's Agri-Business Committee, our annual Agri-Net event and the celebration of our annual Agriculture Award (as part of our Business Achievement Award Gala) both lend credence to the importance of this vital sector.

While considerable progress has been made in bringing the rural business players a little closer to their urban counterparts, there nevertheless remains a considerable divide between the two. We can and should be able to do better.

For over 100 years the *Ontario International Plowing Match and Rural Expo* has done its part in helping to close that gap. In fact one of the objects of their constitution reads:

To advance the interest of rural economic development through a focus on agriculture, conservation, and management of rural resources building on the volunteer effort for community betterment.

During its hundred year history, the Plowing Match has customarily been held on huge tracts of agricultural land in rural parts of the province. Having said that, we are reminded that there exists nearly 40,000 acres of agricultural farmland within the boundaries of the City of London so in fact we are already advancing the interest of rural economic development right here in our own backyard.

If after carefully evaluating the needed requirements as set out by the *Ontario International Plowing Match and Rural Expo* that are a prerequisite to hosting a future match, and, if those needs can be reasonably satisfied, then the Chamber would encourage the development of a business case to enable the City to move forward on a future bid to host the *Ontario International Plowing Match and Rural Expo.* Obviously any effort to formulate a bid can only succeed if it is done in the context of a joint effort with our rural partners. Additionally, the business case should take into account how this event has been trending over the past number of years to ensure that its economic impact provides true return on investment.

The specific year of such a bid to be determined and mutually agreed upon by the London/Region Host Bid Committee and the Ontario Plowmen's Association.

BIDDING GUIDELINES

Updated 2015

The IPM event is owned by the Ontario Plowmen's Association (OPA) and as such OPA assumes ultimate liability for the event.

The primary purpose of the IPM is to assist in fulfilling the objectives of the OPA as mandated both through its Constitution and the Agricultural and Horticultural Organizations Act of Ontario.

OBJECTIVES

- To promote the development, sale and export of agricultural products
- To provide educational opportunities related to agriculture and rural life
- To advance the interest in agriculture by emphasizing the importance of proper cultivation and to encourage modern soil and water conservation practices
- To co-operate in conducting demonstrations and experiments in plowing and in other methods of soil cultivation and crop production
- To conduct annually the "International Plowing Match & Rural Expo"

In addition, the IPM shall strive to accomplish these objectives:

- To showcase the County/Region/District, its businesses and contributions to society by its citizens
- To generate economic development in the County/Region/District
- To build community spirit and pride of citizenship among members of the County/Region/District
- To leave a community-oriented legacy to the County/Region/District

ELEMENTS ASSOCIATED WITH THE IPM

The following are mandatory elements of the IPM:

- The International Plowing Competition of qualifying finalists from Branch Association Matches, competitors across Canada and North America
- An awards presentation for IPM competitors
- · Opening and Closing Ceremonies
- The Ontario Queen of the Furrow Competition
- An awards presentation for Ontario Queen of the Furrow competitors
- A Tented City to showcase exhibitors of products and services related to agriculture, food production and rural living
- An educational program of agriculture and food production designed to compliment provincial school curriculums

The following are recommended elements of the IPM, although they are not mandatory:

- An historical exhibit to showcase rural life and agriculture indigenous to the area
- A family living exhibit with Tented City
- A County/Region/District exhibit within Tented City
- A souvenir program
- An accommodation service and RV Park for out of town visitors
- Multidenominational Church Worship Service
- Property beautification competition among real estate property within the County/Region/District
- Special events, entertainment by artists residing or native to the area
- Demonstrations area of machinery equipment, crops, production, processing
- Licensed lounge for exhibitors, guests and visitors

GUIDELINES FOR IPM SITE SELECTION

The following are guidelines for selecting a site for the International Plowing Match and Rural Expo. All Counties/Regions/Districts should be aware of the guidelines before bidding for the IPM.

- There must be a general neighbourhood agreement to hosting the International Plowing Match and Rural Expo by the land owners as well as their neighbours
- The County/Region/District must be unanimous in their support financially,

Land required for Tented City:

- Approximately 85-100 acres
- At least 2nd year sod, level, no wet spots
- Must lend itself to traditional Tented City rectangular layout approximately 2,000' x 2,000'
- Good road access on at least two sides (4 sides is optimum)
- Tented City land should be in the centre of the land to be used for parking and plowing
- Perimeter parking around Tented City (2000'x2,000') should be 4 sides of 500'

Land required for Parking

- Approximately 250 to 300 acres (80-100 cars per acre)
- Preferable sod but stubble accepted
- Most should be adjacent to Tented City

Land required for Plowing

- 300 acres stubble or sod
- As close to Tented City as possible
- Level and well drained

Hydro

Three phased power immediately adjacent to Tented City site

Telephone and Internet

- Phone lines available for Service Area in Tented City and Emergency Services area.
- Cell phone service to meet the needs of Volunteers, Exhibitors and Visitors (booster transmission towers are sometimes needed)
- Internet service for Volunteers, Exhibitors and Visitors

Roads

- a location which will allow good access to at least two sides (4 Sides is optimum) of the Tented
 City
- reasonable distance to main highways
- local municipalities must accept financial responsibility for costs
- local municipalities must accept financial responsibility for costs of new or rebuilt roads if required

Soil

- Preferably a soil type capable of accepting reasonable amounts of rain without becoming mired
- Preferably tile drained

Restoration

• The site will be returned as near as possible to its original state with regard to replacing fences, repairing tile drains, etc.

Dates

- Work in Tented City begins about mid-July; Hydro One begins work in early August and tents are erected starting about August 20th. Staking of the exhibitor lots is done at approximately August 20th also.
- Some Exhibitors may set up about four –(4) weeks before the opening day; major activities occur from then on
- Site normally cleared by Thanksgiving Weekend or shortly thereafter.

- Plowing land and parking land required about two (2) weeks in advance for staking
- Exact fields should be designated by the local committee in consultation with OPA in fall of previous year to facilitate map printing, etc.

Compensation

- Compensation rates are decided by the OPA Board of Directors.
- The rental rate for Tented City is not to exceed \$150/acre; Parking and plow lands is not to exceed \$50/acre; RV Park is not to exceed \$150/acre. All rates are plus HST.
- Lands that are Optioned to Lease are compensated at a rate not to exceed \$5/acre
- A normal payment (usually \$5/acre) to bind the agreement as soon as possible after the site is selected will be made with the balance due within 30 days following the event
- The advance payment will be provided by OPA
- Final selection of the site will be made by the Board of Directors of the OPA in co-operation with the Local Committee Board of Directors

Additional Site Selection Factors

- Local committees must ensure that the standard OPA Option to Lease and Lease forms are
 used for all land required for the IPM. All leases are to be signed and registered by at least 24
 months before the IPM. A representative of the OPA must sign these leases.
- Cropping programs will be the responsibility of the individual land owners and the local committee
- Adequate water would be an asset, but it is not a major factor in selecting a site
- Accommodations adequate accommodations is a must in the immediate area and within a 50 mile radius. Reasonable prices are also a major consideration.
- Several alternative sites should be available within a County/Region/District that places a bid for the International Plowing Match & Rural Expo

 - o Internet
 - o Hydro
 - o Water
 - o Sewage
 - o Garbage
- Transportation
 - o Bus, airplane
- Accommodations ** this is an important feature

 - Bed & Breakfasts
 - o Hotels / Motels
- Banquet / Catering / Restaurant
- Support From Local Businesses
- Support from Local and County / Regional District Governments
