Request Made: Tuesday, June 26, 2012

TIMING OF LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD CEREMONY

At the June 26, 2012 Council meeting, Mayor Joe Fontana announced that the city Culture Office would be making application to rename Riverside Park to be M.A. Baran Park. At this recognition MP Susan Truppe and MPP Deb Matthews presented certificates of recognition from the Prime Minister and Premier of Ontario as Parliament and the Ontario Legislature were not in session at that time.

REQUEST DESCRIPTION

It is being requested that "Riverside Park" be re-named "M. A. Baran Park" in recognition of the lifetime achievements of Mr. Baran and to celebrate the 90th anniversary of his company Trudell Medical.

Riverside Park is located at the Forks of the Thames River on the west side where the Blackburn Fountain is located. The west boundary of this park is the Kiwanis Seniors Centre. An aerial photograph of the park is attached as Appendix A to this report.

REQUESTER

Robin Armistead, Manager of Culture and Municipal Policy is making this request to the City Clerk on behalf of former City Manager Jeff Fielding. Jeff sent the following email to Mayor Joe Fontana and he cc'd the family of Mitchell Baran:

"I mentioned several months ago that a tribute to Mitch Baran was in the works. I am pleased to tell you that the rough outline for a celebration of Mitch's accomplishments has been sketched out today. Let me brief you. This is the 90th anniversary for Trudell and the Council can use this milestone as a 'touch point' to recognize Mitch at City hall. It is planned to have a reception on the 12th floor prior to the Council meeting, and to invite family and friends to join in the celebration. We will ask for letters of recognition from the Prime Minister and the Premier. The date will be fixed sometime in May/June. Once the tribute moves to the floor of Council it is anticipated that you would recognize Mitch and that the City would have a street or park named in his honour. Robin Armistead will coordinate the activities through my office. Let me know if this works."

The Mayor has indicated his support for this recognition to occur. This request was brought to the City of London Senior Management Team meeting by Jeff Fielding on Tuesday January 17, 2012 and at that time he suggested that recognition of citizens that make a significant contribution to the city of London continue on an ongoing basis.

An email is attached from Mr. George Baran, who is the son of Mitchell Baran, which acknowledges support for the request.

ELIGIBILITY AND REQUESTED APPROVAL PROCESS IN THE PARK RE-NAMING POLICY OF COUNCIL

The request being made for Mr. Baran to be honoured by dedicating a prominent park currently being developed to be named after him is applicable under the Naming/Re-naming or Dedicating of Municipal Property, Buildings and Park Elements Policy 3(7A) as the policy states under its Intent Section that "individuals may be considered in special circumstances".

Mr. Baran has made a significant lifetime achievement contribution to the London community and to our society with the creation of his medical devices such as the Asthma Aero-chamber, and this is the right year to provide this award as it is the 90th anniversary of his company, Trudell Medical, in 2012.

It is requested, based on this policy, that this application be circulated to internal stakeholders, and will be subject to a public participation process as outlined in the city policy.

Financial Contribution to the Park

The Baran family has offered to provide the City with a contribution of \$100,000 toward the development and/or enhancement of the park if it were named after Mitchell Baran (financial contributions are referred to in the Policy) but it is was never intended to be the reason for this proposed park re-naming recognition. The funding would be a welcome contribution to the City to be able to complete the development of this park all the way to the Kiwanis Senior's Centre.

Any associated expenses for the park sign could come from this funding contribution. The City Manager's Office will cover the costs of the small reception in the cafeteria before the Council meeting.

RATIONALE TO SUPPORT THIS RECOGNITION

Previous Awards Mitch Baran Has Received

- 1. In recognition of his contribution to the Chartered Accountant profession and his successful business career, Mr. Baran has been inducted as a Fellow into the Ontario Institute of Chartered Accountants and has been given an Honorary Doctorate of Laws from the University of Western Ontario (2011).
- 2. In addition, Mr. Baran is also the founding Chairman and a significant financial supporter of Let's Talk Science, a national initiative to promote science literacy in Canada developing effective teaching strategies through research. Let's Talk Science is organized as a not for profit organization that garners support from both the private and government sectors. Over the past 15 years it has also drawn critical acclaim from such prestigious organizations as the Conference Board of Canada. He has been the recipient of the 2006 Lay Category, Partners in Research Biomedical Ambassadors Award as well as the Paul Harris Fellowship Award from the London Rotary Club.
- 3. Mitchell Baran is an inductee of the London Business Hall of Fame
- 4. In 2008, Mitchell Baran was the recipient of the London Chamber of Commerce Business Achievement (ICON) Award.
- Mitchell was inducted into the Junior Achievement Hall of Fame in 2003.

6. In 2011, Mr. Baran was conferred a honourary Doctor of Law from Western University. Mr. Baran has been a strong advocate for the creation of the University Vice President (Research) portfolio and has also been an articulate spokesperson for the importance of public research in the community.

Significant Contributions to both the London Community and to Society

Mr. Baran has made a significant contribution to the development of London and it is an opportune time being the 90th anniversary of his company Trudell Medical to celebrate this lifetime achievement. The City of London should take the opportunity to promote this success story of Mr. Baran's demonstration of loyalty to our community by a company that has grown to be internationally recognized. He has also given back to the London community through his philanthropy. Examples of known contributions to both London and to society in general include:

Philanthropic Contribution

- Along with his wife and children, Mr. Baran has set up a community fund with the London Community Foundation which is allocated by the London Community Foundation Grants Committee. The Mitchell and Kathryn Baran Family Foundation provide annual financial support to various charities and in particular, those that serve the poor and needy, education, innovation and research.
- As a huge proponent for support of social and community issues, Mr Baran has raised the
 funds for Mission Services of London and the Grand Theatre Foundation and has provided
 donations to the United Way of London and Middlesex and other community organizations
 such as the Salvation Army, the M.S. Society, the Lithotripsy Program at St. Joseph's
 Hospital, and the Memorial Boys and Girls Club of London.
- Mr. Baran has donated to the London and Area Food Bank and assisted the Food Bank with the purchase of their new building.
- Mr. Baran has served as Chairman of St. Mary's Hospital, Marian Villa Home for the Aged, and is a past member of the Executive Committee of St. Joseph's Health Centre. Currently he is a member of the St. Joseph's Society, the umbrella organization for the hospital owned by the Sisters of St. Joseph in the Diocese of London.
- Mr. Baran's company Trudell Medical also helps relief organizations around the world by donating medical equipment and supplies to emergency clinics in places of need.

Education Contribution

- Mr. Baran has been a generous supporter of the University of Western Ontario, including a \$1 million donation to support the development of the Medical Sciences Renovation Project to support the completion of laboratories at the Schulich School of Medicine, Dentistry, Department of Physiology and Pharmacology. He has contributed to the development of next-generation leaders through his support of student awards and faculty fellowships.
- Mr. Baran is Chairman of Let's Talk Science, a national initiative to promote science literacy
 in Canada developing effective teaching strategies through research. The Conference
 Board of Canada has generated a positive research paper supporting the activities of Let's
 Talk Science. Since its inception, Let's Talk Science has engaged an estimated 2.5 million
 children, youth and educators.

- In 1998, Mr. Baran made a significant donation that led to the creation of the A. M. Cuddy Graduate Scholarship in neuroscience.
- The Baran family also created two student awards for the Childhood and Family Relations Program and the Social Justice and Peace Program at Kings University College in 2005.

Medical Research Contribution

- Mr. Baran has supported research expansively especially in the areas of Asthma and respiratory treatment which has resulted in the development of significant technological advances such as the development of the AeroChamber for use with asthma puffers.
- Mr. Baran has volunteered his time to support provincial organizations such as the Ontario Health Industry Advisory Committee and the Ontario Home Respiratory Services Association.
- Mr. Baran has served as a volunteer member of the St. Joseph's Hospital Board between 1985 until 1993.
- Mr. Baran has been instrumental in the development of Western's Technology Transfer Office and its evolution into World Discoveries Inc. Since 2006, World Discoveries Inc. has become London's city-wide technology transfer agency of record representing all public research facilities in the region. He founded the World Discoveries Advisory Council, which assisted in the selection of deserving technologies for financial support from Western University's Innovation Fund. He has been a major donor to research concerning science and technology at Western University.

Example of a Successful and Loyal London Company

- Mitchell Baran has grown the Trudell Medical Group Company to the point where it is considered to be one of the most successful medical device companies in Canada. His company is an example of a business from London that has competed successfully on the world class stage.
- The annual Trudell Medical Urology Golf Tournament has engaged the London community to support the St. Joseph's Urology Centre for more than a decade. Mr. Baran contributes both personally and with corporate volunteer and financial support.

BIOGRAPHICAL INFORMATION

Mitchell Baran was raised in Brantford, Ontario. He is a graduate of the Honours Business Administration program (HBA) at the University of Western Ontario (1959). After graduation, he accepted a position at Clarkson, Gordon Co., a firm of chartered accountants (now Ernst and Young) and obtained his Chartered Accountant degree in 1962. He is married to Kathryn Baran and they have raised four children in London.

90th Anniversary of Trudell Medical Group

The Trudell Medical Group celebrates its 90th anniversary this year. In 1967, Mr. Baran acquired his wife's grandfather's 12 employee medical supply company, originally founded in 1923.

Over the last 36 years as Chairman of the Trudell Medical Group, Mr. Baran has grown his family owned business into a multi-faceted, international medical device company employing over 1,000 people across manufacturing, distribution and investment operations. The Trudell Medical Group carries on activities in product development, manufacturing and distribution of medical devices in Canada, the U.S. and other major international markets throughout the world. The company also provides a wide range of home care services within the Canadian market. The company's major customers include GlaxoSmithKline, Boehinger Ingelheim, TEVA Pharmaceuticals and others.

The business covers a broad base including respiratory and non-invasive devices and other products including the flagship product the AeroChamber® which is a valved holding chamber used by patients who require aerosolized medication delivered from a metered dose inhaler.

Investment into Other Companies in the London Community

In recent years, Mr. Baran and his seasoned management team have actively invested in several emerging technology-based companies. His investment of personal time, reputation and experience has been a catalyst in attracting millions of dollars to these academic-based ventures which include Viron Therapeutics Inc. and CVD Diamond, both based in London. Mr. Baran is a director of several Canadian and U.S. companies and is currently Chairman of Viron Therapeutics Inc., a clinical stage biopharmaceutical company pioneering the development of viral proteins to treat and prevent human inflammation. Mr Baran is President of Monaghan Medical Corporation a company which sells and manufacturers medical device products which increase the quality of life; President of Northgate Technologies, Inc. who supplies, develops and manufacturers innovative, state-of-the-art invasive surgery products and is a past Director and founding investor of Oriel Therapeutics a respiratory drug delivery development company that was merged into a multinational pharmaceutical company in early 2010.

Support for Innovation in Canada

Mr. Baran is passionate about the importance of the role of innovation in Canada's future economy and quality of life and has served as a past President of the Medical Devices Advisory Council, a Government of Canada initiative to promote competitiveness in the Canadian medical devices industry, Med Tech, an exposition designed to showcase innovative Canadian medical devices and assist researchers and inventors to bring their products to market and the Greater London Health Care Initiative. He is also a past member of the Ontario Health Industry Advisory Committee (HIAC) and the Health Industries Development Council (HIDCO), both medical industry initiatives of the Province of Ontario. He has also served as a board member of Materials & Manufacturing Ontario (MMO). He is a member of the Technology Transfer and Commercialization Advisory Council of the University of Western Ontario.

I am delighted to hear of the plan to rename Riverside Park in honour of Mitch Baran, an accomplished and generous graduate of Western (HBA'59), whom last year we recognized with an honorary degree.

Mitch has made his home in London since he first came to Western and ever since the city has been fortunate to have been the beneficiary of his business acumen and philanthropy. Dear Ms. Armistead,

I enthusiastically support the renaming of Riverside Park in honour of Mitch Baran. Mr. Baran has been a stalwart supporter of so many initiatives in London, including naming a wing in the Medical Sciences Building of the Schulich School of Medicine & Dentistry. However, more important than the funding provided for the building was the 'push' that Mitch gave to the School and to the Department of Physiology & Pharmacology which is housed in the wing, to be truly innovative.

Mitch's personal creativity and leadership of bold new ventures sets him apart from most people. 
