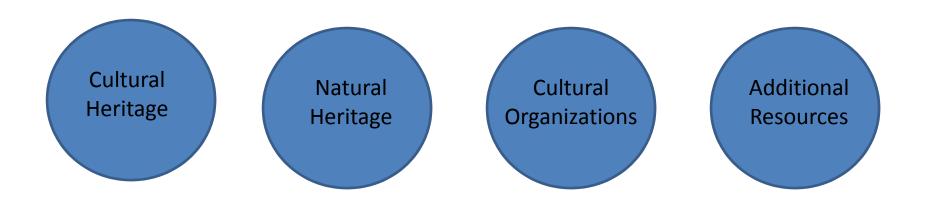

Economic Impact Calculation of Culture

Purpose of the report:

To conduct an economic impact analysis of the cultural sector-- generate a dollar value of the direct economic contribution of a defined cultural sector for the City of London Information compiled from published data sources, cultural community partners and public administrators

Cultural Facilities Planning

Conclusions:

Cultural facility development has been stalled for a long time

The state of cultural facilities is a civic development issue

The City needs to take leadership – there is a need to plan for cultural facility development and maintenance





What is the Cultural Prosperity Plan?

- It is a strategic policy framework document that provides a collective vision and direction for culture in London
- It will drive change in London's cultural landscape by putting forward a series of strategic directions, objectives and actions

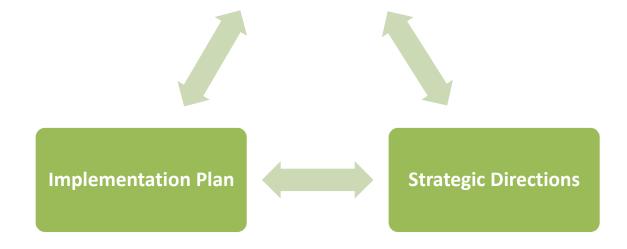

Expected Outcomes of the Cultural Plan and Profile
